Setsuo Miyazawa

Professor Setsuo Miyazawa is a legal sociologist who received his LL.B., LL.M., and S.J.D. from Hokkaido University and M.A., M.Phil., and Ph.D. in sociology from Yale. Prof. Miyazawa first came to UC Law SF as a visiting professor in 2008, and he worked to develop the law school's East Asian curriculum. In 2015, Professor Miyazawa co-founded what would later become the Center for East Asian Legal Studies, where he serves as Senior Director Emeritus and Senior Affiliated Scholar. Professor Miyazawa has a wide range of research interests, including police and criminal justice, legal ethics and public interest lawyering, legal education, and corporate legal practice. He has published or edited over a dozen Japanese and English books. His book Policing in Japan (SUNY Press, 1992), received the 1993 Distinguished Book Award of the American Society of Criminology. Professor Miyazawa was highly active in the promotion of judicial reform in Japan in the early 2000s, where he was one of the most prominent proponents of the introduction of American-style post-graduate professional law schools. He has been active in and served in leadership roles in organizations such as the US Law and Society Association and the Asian Criminological Society.
