The Thomas Franck Merit Scholarship was created to recognize the extraordinary academic and professional achievements of the late Thomas Franck. Only one LL.M. student at the University of California College of the Law, San Francisco (UC Law SF) per year will be awarded this prestigious full-tuition scholarship. All UC Law SF LL.M. applicants are eligible to apply.

In order to qualify for this scholarship, you must submit a letter from your law school stating that you completed your first degree in law in the top 10% of your class. You must also submit this completed form and your complete LL.M. application by **February 1** to be considered for this scholarship. The decision will be made after March 1.

**NOTE: UC Law SF must receive your completed LL.M. application from LSAC by no later than February 1**. It can take weeks for LSAC to evaluate transcripts and process TOEFL/IELTS scores. Please plan accordingly. Your application will NOT be considered complete, even if you have already submitted all documents to LSAC, if we have not received your completed application, including official transcripts and letters of recommendation, from LSAC.
